Between the 21st of June and the 24th of July, I decided to challenge myself to a sponsored cycle. The money raised would be split between Alzheimer Scotland and Our Dementia Choir. I visited Pollok Park, where I saw the calves, and I got to feed them big massive leaves. I also visited Linn Park and Rouken Glen Park to see the ducklings, baby swans and loads of cute dogs! I did, however, run into problems. I fell off my bike onto the road, but luckily I was outside a pub where two elderly men helped me up and offered me a drink. I also burst a tyre but thankfully I was finished my cycle for the day. I hosted a quiz at the end of the cycle, the topic was Line of Duty and general knowledge. By the end of the cycle, I achieved my goal of 300.22 miles and raised £444.01 for dementia.


Having recently gone through various investigative procedures, followed by chemotherapy and radiotherapy treatments for High Grade Non-Hodgkin Lymphoma, most of which was rather unpleasant, I want to tell you how much better I (and Liz) felt after every single card, call, text and kind word we received. Whether from family, close friends, general acquaintances or people we hardly really knew at all, every expression of concern and every good wish really did make a difference. So thanks – from both of us – to everyone who got in touch. It really was appreciated.

Our recent experience has shown us that, while many people had little difficulty getting in touch, many others found it really hard, or just couldn't do it even although they wanted to (some people have told me this now they've heard that my treatment appears to have been successful). Maybe the very thought of cancer brought back painful memories or maybe they just didn't know what to say. Anyway, my point in writing this wee note is to encourage all of you; if you hear of anyone dealing with any health or other difficult issues, get in touch to let them know you care. Believe me, it really will make a difference.
